GOVERNING REGULATIONS 2023 NABESHIMA CUP & TEXAS OPEN KENDO TAIKAIS

- I. The Nabeshima Cup Invitational Kendo Tournament is a set of individual tournaments comprised of 5 brackets held for kenshi holding a rank of sandan or lower (Junior Youth, Senior Youth, Women, Mudansha, and Yudansha) and the Texas Open, an individual tournament held for all kenshi holding a rank of yondan or higher. The Nabeshima Cup Invitational Kendo Tournament is designed to promote friendship among fellow kenshi and to allow kenshi to gain experience in shiai kendo.
- II. Shinpan duty all participants of the Texas Open and other attending kenshi of yondan rank will be asked to be shinpan for the Nabeshima Cup brackets in the registration package. Though not mandatory, it is recommended that all yondan signup for shinpan duty. All godan and higher will be asked to be shinpan for the Texas Open. Shinpan dress code will be the official FIK taikai uniform.
- III. The Nabeshima Cup Invitational Kendo tournaments and the Texas Open Kendo tournament will be formatted as single elimination tournaments based on the number of participants.
- IV. Matches
 - A. All matches are sanbon-shobu (3 point match). In the event of a forfeit, the winner is awarded 2 points.
 - B. Youth division matches will be 2 minutes in length with a 1 minute encho. In the event of a tie in scoring after encho, a hantei judgment will be issued to determine the match winner.
 - C. All other Nabeshima Cup matches will be 3 minutes in length with a 2 minute encho. In the event of a tie in scoring after encho, a hantei judgment will be issued to determine the match winner.
 - D. Texas Open matches will be 3 minutes with unlimited encho.
 - E. Youth semi-final and final matches will be 3 minutes in length with unlimited encho.
 - F. All other semi-final and final matches will be 5 minutes in length with unlimited encho and will occur after all divisional matches leading up the semi-final and final matches have concluded.
- V. Seeding brackets
 - A. Women participants may choose to enter either womens, mudansha, or yudansha divisions depending on rank and skill, but will only be allowed to enter a single bracket.
 - B. Participants of all brackets will be seeded according to rank, age, and dojo. Efforts will be made to avoid seeding competitors of the same dojo in the same brackets.
 - C. Competitors will be assigned a court and competitor number based on their seeded position.
- VI. All equipment, including shinai, must adhere to regulation sizes, weights, and characteristics established by the International Kendo Federation. Shinai must be

inspected, weighed and approved prior to the taikai opening. Competitors observed using unapproved shinai during the taikai risk disqualification.

- VII. All decisions of the judges are final. All other governing regulations will follow the rules and guidance of the International Kendo Federation.
 - A. Provisional Shiai and Shinpan Rules
 - 1. Actions such as intentional time wasting or approaching the opponent in a defensive posture (avoiding competing) shall be deemed hansoku in accordance with Article 1 of the Regulations.
 - 2. If close-quarters contact is entered during an attack, defense or strike, the shiai-sha must proactively perform hiki-waza or other techniques from taiatari (vocalization allowed) as soon as contact is made. Furthermore, if contact results in tsubazeriai, but no technique is forthcoming, shiai-sha should take initiative and separate quickly. Shiai-sha need not wait for the shinpan-in to call "Wakare" or "Yame" but should endeavor to separate of their own volition.
 - 3. The time taken to move out of tsubazeriai should be approximately one breath.
 - 4. Techniques should not be attempted when moving out of tsubazeriai. If a technique is executed at such a time, it shall not be judged as a valid strike (yuko-datotsu). A shiai-sha may be penalized (hansoku) if, in the course of separating, they follow the other and attempt a technique, or gives the impression that they are moving back but then attacks. Furthermore, in the course of separating shiai-sha must not hit, bind or push the opponent's shinai, nor should they reverse cross their shinai (gyaku-kosa). (Shinpan-in will make a judgment based on the circumstances and causes following gogi)
 - 5. When separating, both shiai-sha should move back far enough so that their kensen are not touching.
 - 6. Do not open or lower the kensen when separating.
 - Shiai-sha should not retreat out of sync when moving away from tsubazeriai. Furthermore, shiai-sha should not separate in small steps. They should push off utilizing the power generated from correct tsubazeriai with both tsuba pressed together and retreat in one movement.
 - 8. Face Masks and Shields may be optionally worn, but are not required.
- VIII. Two perpetual trophy awards (Nabeshima Cup) will be awarded to the winners; one for the mudansha division and one for the yudansha division. Individual medals for all divisional winners, 2nd and 3rd place finishers, including kantosho (Fighting Spirit) recipients for each bracket, will also be awarded.
- IX. The Nabeshima Cups are perpetual trophies awarded to the winners. The cups are the property of the Dallas/Ft. Worth Kendo & laido Kyokai, and must be returned to the organization when the next Nabeshima Cup event is held, as the winners are always invited back to defend his or her title.




